
RUBIS GROUP ENDOWMENT FUND FOR COMMITTED SOCIAL AND ARTISTIC PROJECTS






There are currently three ongoing programmes in South Africa, Jamaica and Madagascar, which aim to make a lasting contribution to the training and support of these young people towards meaningful employment by using art and design as a means of empowerment and positive engagement.

INPULSE

Vocational integration programme through artistic practice KINGSTON, JAMAICA Since 2015

For nearly 10 years, Rubis Mécénat has been supporting young adults from the volatile communities of Kingston in Jamaica, using artistic practice as a positive means of expression and personal development.







Workshop with Johanna Castillo, Dominican Republic, 2022

For nearly 10 years, InPulse has been striving to sustainably promote the personal and professional development of young adults from the local communities of Kingston, in Jamaica, by opening up fresh prospects for them through artistic practice, and by giving them keys to develop and progress in an environment prone to instability and precariousness.

The young people involved in the InPulse programme receive intensive training in the field of the visual arts, with additional input from a network of professionals. Each year, the programme awards scholarships to the most promising students to allow them to pursue college studies at Kingston's arts university, the Edna Manley College of the Visual and Performing Arts.

The programme is managed locally by Camille Chedda, Jamaican visual artist.

InPulse has been such an important programme to our art ecosystem.

Students join the programme at a pivotal point in their lives when they have an interest in art but have uncertainties about it, and the programme in turn helps to nurture and encourage their interests.

NDAO HANAVAO

Innovation and training laboratory for social design ANTANANARIVO, MADAGASCAR Since 2018

In Madagascar, Rubis
Mécénat has been developing
innovative design projects
for the past 5 years within
its Ndao Hanavao laboratory,
which respond to local
social and environmental
issues while helping young
entrepreneurs to emerge.





Rubis Mécénat has set up in 2018 in Madagascar Ndao Hanavao, an eco-humanitarian research and training laboratory for social design. It has a twofold purpose; on the one hand, the lab aims to respond to local societal and environmental issues through innovative, viable and sustainable design projects, developed in collaboration with guest designers. On the other hand, the lab aims to make a lasting contribution to the professional integration of young Madagascans in difficulty by supporting them in the development of commercial and collaborative initiatives based on projects developed in the lab.

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Three projects are currently being developed within the laboratory:

- a project to collect and transform plastic waste into utilitarian objects with the French designer Alexandre Echasseriau;
- a project to collect and transform invasive algae with the French designer Samuel Tomatis;
- a project to collect and transform plastic waste into wool with the Franco-British designers of The Polyfloss Factory.

Ndao Hanavao was developed in collaboration with Benjamin Loyauté, the project' curator, and is managed locally by Domi Sanji, design project manager, and Camille de Roffignac, training and logistics project manager.

Ndao Hanavao is seeking to develop a local laboratory for research and community action by offering young adults an education and training programme linked to design and its local economy.



OF SOUL AND JOY

Vocational integration programme through photography THOKOZA, JOHANNESBURG SOUTH AFRICA Since 2012

For over 10 years, Rubis Mécénat has been supporting young adults from the underprivileged communities of Johannesburg in South Africa, using the practice of photography as a tool for emancipation.





Since 2012, Rubis Mécénat has been integrating professionally young adults from the township of Thokoza and its surroundings, in South Africa, using the practice of photography as a tool for emancipation and commitment for a future career.

Of Soul and Joy extends its support by providing young photographers with trainings (literacy, computer science, lifeskills, etc.) and access to a network of key cultural players on the local and international scene – a tailor-made support for the emergence of a new generation of South African photographers and for their professional careers.

Each year, the programme awards scholarships to its most promising young photographers to access higher education in photography at a university of their choice, including the Market Photo Workshop in Johannesburg.

The programme is managed locally by South African photographer Jabulani Dhlamini.

Of Soul and Joy is an arts initiative to think about humanity, freedom, and the play of making. Moreover, it inspires the possibility that photography has the potential to also celebrate our existence, spirituality, and creativity.

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SUPPORT FOR EMERGING ARTISTIC CREATION

2023 PROGRAMME

Rubis Mécénat supports contemporary creation in France through artistic production aids for emerging and mid-career artists. The aim of this support is to help artists create works for specific venues and to exhibit them, in collaboration with cultural institutions. The fund also promotes the professional development of young artists, and extends its support through the purchase of works and the production of artists' editions and videos.

As part of its support to emerging contemporary creation and on the occasion of the 2023 Art & Industry Triennial, the Rubis Mécénat endowment fund supports British artist and textile designer Yemi Awosile to create two monumental textile artworks to cover the façade of Hall AP2 at the Frac Grand Large - Hauts-de-France museum in Dunkirk.

Born in 1984, Yemi Awosile is a contemporary British artist whose sculptural installations and works on paper explore the themes of identity, memory and culture based on a minimalist and geometric aesthetic approach. The broader scope of her work bridges design and visual arts through social interventions. She has a degree in visual arts from Goldsmiths University and trained as a textile designer at the Royal College of Art and the Chelsea College of Art in London. Yemi Awosile is also a associate lecturer at Goldsmiths University of London. Her work has been exhibited in several collective and solo exhibitions in Europe and the United States. Her recent projects include collaborations with the Tent Rotterdam art centre, the Tate Gallery and the British Council. Her research into materials can be seen in the collection of textiles at the Victoria and Albert Museum in London, and she was recently commissioned to create two permanent public artworks in London.

Entitled Forty-seventh Samsara, the installation by Yemi Awosile is deployed on the façade of Hall AP2 of the Frac Grand Large museum in Dunkirk. As an artist and designer, she drew inspiration from the geometric designs found in the archives of the textile factories of Roubaix. These 'weaving diagrams' were used to prepare the weaving operations and also symbolise the advent of the industrial revolution.

Attached to a steel frame, the flexible yet sturdy fabric cut-offs form abstract symbols that defy time and the wind. The fabrics represent living archives, a record of our times, while also addressing the heritage that is being constantly passed on through the objects and materials that surround us, and exploring the relationship between the United Kingdom and France through their unique history of textile manufacturing and production.

As part of this project, in order to encourage local networking and solidarity between the educational, science and cultural sectors, Yemi Awosile will also be running workshops for students from École Supérieure d'Art | Dunkerque-Tourcoing.

Yemi Awosile's project is supported by Kvadrat. This is the second project that Rubis Mécénat has put in place with the Frac Grand Large – Hauts-de- France as part of the Art & Industry Triennial, following the invitation to the French artist Tania Mouraud in 2019.

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Marc Lohner was born in 1993 in Izmir, Turkey, and entered the Beaux-Arts de Paris in 2016, after obtaining a degree in film and audiovisual art from the Université de Paris 3 Sorbonne Nouvelle. He then spent seven months on exchange in the sculpture department of the Musashino University of the Arts in Tokyo. He is currently preparing his DNSAP for 2023. Rooted in collective mythological history, his work involves defining new tools for accessing different levels of reality.

EXHIBITION AT ST. EUSTACHE CHURCH, PARIS

3 OCTOBER - 17 DECEMBER 2023

As part of its commitment to emerging contemporary art, Rubis Mécénat is supporting the professionalisation of young artists from the Beaux-Arts de Paris for the third year running. The Rubis Mécénat Prize enables the selected artist to design a work especially for St. Eustache Church and to benefit from the support of an exhibition curator. 2023's winner is Marc Lohner, a 5th year student in Patrick Faigenbaum's studio.

Following in the footsteps of Dhewadi Hadjab, winner in 2021, and Hélène Janicot, winner in 2022, Marc Lohner will create an installation to be exhibited in autumn 2023 at St. Eustache Church, with the support of curator Marc Donnadieu.

For this project, Marc Lohner will create monumental vertical prints made up of photographs taken from the surface of the limestone blocks that top the columns of St. Eustache Church. These 'falls' in the form of linens suspended in the church provide an aerial movement that contrasts with the placidity of the stones.
