A journey between fictions and myths

Orbis Tertius is an exhibition bringing together 20 contemporary artists who have participated in the artistic residency programmes in the oasis city of AlUla, Saudi Arabia. Curated by Arnaud Morand, Head of Arts at AFALULA, it borrows its title from the writings of Jorge Luis Borges and unfolds on the foundations of the total idealist philosophy dear to the author. It revolves around themes such as how the world can be embedded into storytelling, and the inconsistent boundaries between fiction and reality.

Continuing their research in this region with its thousand-year history, marked by the archaeological remains of several pre-Islamic civilisations, as well as by innovative urban planning resolutely turned towards the future, the artists of this exhibition undertake to unfold reality throughout their works. They explore various fields of possibility, where ancestral stories and those of the future respond to each other, where alternative versions of the past adjoin possible futures, where myths and legends hybridise with scientific knowledge.

A fertile international residency programme

The AlUla artists in residency programme serves as a platform for regional and international artists to explore and experiment with their artistic pursuits against the backdrop of AlUla's awe-inspiring landscape, with its 200,000 years of human his to to to to the fosters a dynamic dialogue and collaboration among artists, as well as with the scientific and local communities of AlUla.

Located in the palm grove of Mabiti AlUla and the newly opened artists' lodging in the arts district of AlUla, AlJadidah, the residency programme offers a privileged setting for artists to reflect on and re-evaluate the role and methods of creative practice in the contemporary world.

By delving into questions such as our connection with the past, our responsibility towards the environment, and the integration of local culture into our daily lives, artists contribute to a fresh perspective on our surroundings. Through their art, they weave narratives using various languages of expression, be it through words or visual forms. They draw inspiration from cultural artifacts and natural elements, intertwining them with their imagination.

The AlUla artists in residency programme is an integral part of AlUla's vision for the 21st century, positioning contemporary creation as a fundamental pillar. It acts as a catalyst for the development of artistic practice, leveraging artists' perceptions and critical perspectives while providing them with the time and unparalleled context to nurture their craft.

The residencies serve as an anchor for AlUla's burgeoning arts scene and contribute to the strategic growth of the creative industries, deeply rooted in the land and its heritage. Together, they contribute to the creation of an imagined future for AlUla.

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Curator's editorial

"Now I held in my hands a vast methodical fragment of an unknown planet's entire history, with its architecture and its playing cards, with the dread of its mythologies and the murmur of its languages, with its emperors and its seas, with its minerals and its birds and its fish, with its algebra and its fire, with its theological and metaphysical controversy. And all of it articulated, coherent, with no visible doctrinal intent or tone of parody."

Fables, parables, utopias, legends and myths are all narrative forms harnessed by artists to reveal the tangible world, to reinvent it – and even to abstract from it. In doing so, the artist imbues fiction with an almost ontological quality: a creative simulacrum that requires research as attentive and rigorous as that traditionally demanded in ascertaining truth and verisimilitude. This exercise in alternative thinking, with its detailed nature and complexity, seeks to expand the limits of what is possible. It does so without ever yielding to the limitations of the real, once the fragile boundary between fiction and reality – between mimesis and poiesis – is shattered.

The term Orbis Tertius, borrowed from the first short story in Ficciones, a collection published in 1940 by Argentine writer Jorge Luis Borges, refers to a titanic undertaking aimed at documenting, with extraordinary meticulousness, the fictional world of Tlön. This composition of an imaginary universe also reflects Borges' profound admiration for Arabic literature in all its diversity, from the most scholarly of works to the more informal, including oral traditions exemplified in The Arabian Nights, which he deeply revered. From this universe, Borges borrows the layered construction of a narrative – stories within stories that stack and intertwine. Guided by a taste for mystery, science and literary mischief, the inventors of Orbis Tertius construct a portrait of this mythical civilisation and third world that is so rigorously coherent, it soon becomes astoundingly real. In this dizzying mise en abyme, the orders of the real and the imaginary collide and clash. It is within these fantastical worlds, which exist in symbiotic relation with the world of reality, that our artists are situated, poised to act.

The artists featured in this exhibition share the experience of having lived and conducted their research in the city of AlUla, in Saudi Arabia, as part of residency programmes developed since 2021 by the Royal Commission for AlUla (RCU) and the French Agency for the Development of AlUla (AFALULA). The laboratory is itself remarkable, for it invites artists to narrate this destination into existence. Within the exceptional setting of this oasis-city, with its history stretching back thousands of years, lie the archaeological remains of several pre-Islamic civilisations, coexisting with the tangible and symbolic influences of the Arab world. All this unfolds against a backdrop of innovative urbanism looking to the future, in a city partially veiled by the greenery of its palm groves as well as embraced by a desert landscape and cliff faces, whose fascinating geology has been sculpted by volcanic activity, seas and winds.

In this region, rich with a tapestry of histories, the contributing artists set out in search of the more subtle narratives which, in their own way, define the society and its distinct identities. Each artist, following his or her own path, arrived at a premise shared by the collective: the anecdote, the poem, the allegory, the rock carving, the tale, the rumour or even the joke wield an equal power over the mind. They serve as foundations for establishing alternative geographies of this unique environment and, more broadly, of the world that unfolds before us. Each in their own way, they explore the realms of possibility, where ancestral stories converse with those that are yet to come, where alternate versions of the past sit alongside potential futures, and where myths and legends cross-pollinate with scientific knowledge.

This approach, reminiscent of Borges' beloved fictions, deftly blends authentic literary references with chimerical inventions, where historical figures and apocryphal characters rub shoulders and influence each other on an equal footing. A tacit plea in favour of the power of the idea, an ode to wonder and the pursuit of knowledge. A universe where what is told holds the weight of truth, where the word assumes performative power, and speech becomes an act.

These twenty artists have gathered facts and anecdotes, documented their observations across diverse fields – such as botany, geology, astronomy, crafts, architecture, agriculture, occultism, sociology – unravelled the tangible world and reimagined it through a speculative lens, challenging normative and restrictive notions of knowledge in the process. Their works delve into the interplay of veracity and fantasy that guides the rewriting of a history with missing passages, conceiving a place so unique it seems to exist beyond time and outside this world. Marked by the survival of traditions and practices passed down from ancestors, some of these works trace connections to invisible phenomena, while others focus on the tangible materials of the natural world, their inherent poetic qualities, and the forms of life to which they bear witness. They also speak to the insatiable – and distinctly human – desire to know and dominate the world while courting the perils inherent in this quest.

Just as the creators of Tlön intended, these works make their intrusions through the fissures of our world, finding within them the substance needed to shape another universe and weave its narrative. A world where reality does not precede knowledge but is a function of it. An ontology of the possible, in response to the inherent omissions within the fabric of reality.

About Arts AlUla

The Royal Commission for AlUla (RCU) was established by royal decree in July 2017 to preserve and develop AlUla, a region of outstanding natural and cultural significance in north-west Saudi Arabia. RCU's long-term plan outlines a responsible, sustainable, and sensitive approach to urban and economic development that preserves the area's natural and historic heritage while establishing AlUla as a desirable location to live, work, and visit. This encompasses a broad range of initiatives across archaeology, tourism, culture, education, and the arts, reflecting a commitment to meeting the economic diversification, local community empowerment, and heritage preservation priorities of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 programme.

About the French Agency for AlUla Development (AFALULA)

Born as a result of an intergovernmental agreement signed by France and Saudi Arabia in April 2018, the French Agency for AlUla Development (AFALULA) was founded in Paris in July 2018. In the spirit of collaborative development, AFALULA's objective is to support its Saudi partner, the Royal Commission for AlUla (RCU), in the sustainable economic, tourism, and cultural development of AlUla, a region with an exceptional natural and cultural heritage located in the north-west of Saudi Arabia. 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About AlUla

About AlUla:

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Located 1,100 km from Riyadh, in North-West Saudi Arabia, AlUla is a place of extraordinary natural and human heritage. The vast area, covering 22,561km², includes a lush oasis valley, towering sandstone mountains and ancient cultural heritage sites dating back thousands of years to when the Lihyan and Nabataean kingdoms reigned. The most well-known and recognised site in AlUla is Hegra, Saudi Arabia's first UNESCO World Heritage Site. A 52-hectare ancient city, Hegra was the principal southern city of the Nabataean Kingdom and is comprised of 111 well-preserved tombs, many with elaborate facades cut out of the sandstone outcrops surrounding the walled urban settlement.

Current research also suggests Hegra was the most southern outpost of the Roman Empire after the Roman's conquered the Nabataeans in 106 CE. In addition to Hegra, AlUla is also home to ancient Dadan, the capital of the Dadan and Lihyan Kingdoms and considered to be one of the most developed 1st millennium BCE cities of the Arabian Peninsula, and Jabal Ikmah, an open air library of hundreds of inscriptions and writings in many different languages, which has been recently listed on the UNESCO's memory of the World Register. Also AlUla Old Town Village, a labyrinth of more than 900 mudbrick homes developed from at least the 12th century, which has been selected as one of the World's Best Tourism Villages in 2022 by the UNWTO. Additionally, Hegra Railway and Hegra Fort, which are key sites in the story and conquests of Lawrence of Arabia.
